

TEMPLATE PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

Many radio stations offer non-profits a chance to run public service announcements (PSA) on their station, free of charge. Even if this isn't something you can do, sending a PSA and a press release their way could be a way to let them know what is going on and to get yourself an on-air interview. Sometimes, they will want to record you for the PSA. Other times, they might read it live into their own microphones. Reach out to your local radio stations for more information.

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TEMPLATE EMAIL BLAST

Email is still the best way to reach folks, despite the prevalence of social media, and still has a higher return on investment. We don't recommend that you avoid social media, but we also don't recommend that you invest your time and energy solely into social media. Sending out an email blast can be one of the most effective ways to inform people about your training. The following template can be helpful in crafting your blast.

Eating local

- Serve a local food for a healthy snack. Make a snack by combining two local food components, like apples from your local farmer and yogurt from your local dairy.
- Cook with your students. Try a simple smoothie, tortilla wrap, or a no-bake granola bar.
- Visit a farmers market or locally owned co-op. Many markets and grocery stores have double up food dollar programs for families who purchase local produce using SNAP.
- Cook and enjoy a family meal together, incorporating local foods.
- Share family recipes. Have your child/grandchild copy down a family recipe or cook a meal that you enjoyed when you were their age.

Growing local

- Plant seeds and watch them grow!
- Whether it's a container garden inside, a raised bed in the backyard, or a plot at a community garden, get out and garden as a family.
- Visit a farm, orchard, or pumpkin patch with your students. If you can't get to the farm, attend a virtual farm field trip.
- Participate in a school or community garden clean-up or planting day.
- Plant radishes, a quick growing root, and record observations of their changes every day.

Learning about local

- Sing the" plant parts" song with your students (to the tune of Head, Shoulders, Knees, and Toes): "Roots, Stem, Leaves and Flowers, Leaves and Flowers (Repeat)/ Flowers grow to Fruits then drop their Seeds/ Root, Stem, Leaves and Flowers, Leaves and Flowers."
- Use a pumpkin to highlight math concepts by measuring its weight, height, and circumference and counting the seeds inside.
- Read a new book about apples, like "Apple Farmer Annie" by Monica Wellington, and make applesauce together.
- Use arts and crafts such as coloring, painting, cutting, and pasting or other creative projects to reinforce excitement for fruits and vegetables.



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• Make time for your students to practice their literacy while cultivating gratitude by writing "Thank You" notes to the school food service team and/or local farmers.
